# Community Colleges Exempted from State Leadership Directive for Budget Reductions for FYs 2020-2021



May 20, 2020

To: State Agency Board/Commission Chairs
State Agency Heads/Executive Directors
Appellate Court Justices and Judges
Chancellors, Presidents, and Directors of Institutions and Agencies of Higher Education

Please accept our sincere thanks for the incredible work provided by your agencies and institutions and the dedication you have shown to help the state through this troubling time. Each agency has taken on the challenge and worked tirelessly to ensure that essential services are provided to Texans in need. Know that we are committed to prioritizing the public health of our state.

As you have no doubt seen, there is significant economic uncertainty not only in this state but across the country and around the world. We are confident that Texas will get back to work and continue leading the nation in job growth, economic innovation, and business creation. However, it will take months until we know the true extent of the economic ramifications of COVID-19, and how combating this virus will impact state finances. To prepare for this economic shock, we must take action today to ensure that the state can continue providing the essential government services that Texans expect.

To achieve that goal, every state agency and institution of higher education must engage in prudent fiscal management efforts. Savings achieved in the current biennium are not only necessary to offset current year revenue losses, the savings will provide for the smoothest path toward recovery as you provide necessary services to Texans. Some cost saving strategies that agencies should pursue that will not affect the state's response to COVID-19 include foregoing any capital expenditures that can be deferred, any avoidable travel expenditures, any administrative expenses that are not mission critical, and keeping unfilled any open positions that are not essential to the COVID-19 response. These savings should be lapsed to the Treasury.

Additionally, we request each state agency and institution of higher education submit a plan identifying savings that will reduce your general and general revenue related appropriations by five percent for the 2020-2021 biennium. Please submit this plan to the Legislative Budget Board and the Office of the Governor by June 15, 2020.

Given the importance of the state's response to COVID-19 and the continuity of critical government functions, the following are excluded from the five percent reduction:

 Appropriations to the Texas Division of Emergency Management, the Texas Department of State Health Services, the Texas Workforce Commission, the Texas Military Department, and the Texas Department of Public Safety: May 20, 2020 Page 2

- · Funding for debt service requirements and bond authorizations;
- · Current law requirements for the Foundation School Program and school safety;
- · Funding for Child Protective Services;
- Benefits and eligibility levels in Medicaid programs, the Children's Health Insurance Program, the foster care program, the adoption subsidies program, the permanency care assistance program, and services for individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities;
- · Funding for behavioral health service programs;
- Appropriations for Correctional Security Operations and Correctional Managed Health Care at the Texas Department of Criminal Justice;
- · Appropriations to Health Related Institutions and Community Colleges; and
- Employer Contributions to the Teacher Retirement System and Employees Retirement System funds and to Social Security.

In the coming weeks, the Legislative Budget Board and the Office of the Governor will issue instructions for the Legislative Appropriations Request that each state agency and institution of higher education will submit for the 2022-2023 biennium. While the exact final instructions are still being determined, every state agency and institution should prepare to submit reduced budget requests as well as strategies to achieve further savings. Furthermore, when the state revenue picture becomes clearer in the coming months, it may become necessary to make additional budget adjustments.

Though state leaders will make difficult decisions in the future, please know that we will not impede your agency's response to the coronavirus threat or take actions that will harm the public health of this state. As Texans recover from this pandemic, it is incumbent that state government continues to maintain mission critical services without placing a greater burden on taxpayers. Your assistance in achieving these goals is imperative.

Our offices stand ready to assist you with any questions you have or any clarifications that may be necessary. Thanks again for your service to the state and her people. We will get through this time by helping our fellow neighbors and relying on them in turn.



# Taskforce Finds

- Dual credit courses are an effective but under-funded strategy that provides more benefit to students who complete more dual credit hours
- Academically and economically disadvantaged students are a growing majority of community college students, but the Success Points model does not reflect their obstacles to attainment of the transfer or completion metrics
- Changes to the Success Point base weights proposed by Rider 19 of HB 1 (86th-R) would significantly and abruptly alter the distribution of points in a manner inconsistent with the goals of 60x30TX
- The critical fields designation process lacks much-needed transparency and predictability, and the fields do not align well with Texas' workforce needs.

## Taskforce Recommends

- Awarding an additional .50 Success Point weight for students who completed at least 15 semester credit hours of dual credit
- Awarding an additional .50 Success Point weight for academically or economically disadvantaged students upon credential completion or university transfer
- Maintaining Success Point base weights at BY 2020-21 levels
- Replacing Student Success Point critical fields with "targeted fields" selected through a standardized, evidence-based methodology that better reflects current and projected conditions in the Texas labor market
- Instituting a formal, iterative process to designate and undesignate targeted fields in a transparent, predictable, and evidence-based manner.

#### Four Texas Community Colleges Named Finalists for \$1 Million Aspen Prize

Austin, TX – The Aspen Institute announced four Texas community colleges – Amarillo College, Odessa College, San Antonio College and San Jacinto College – among the 10 finalists for the 2021 Aspen. Prize for Community, College. Excellence, the nation's signature recognition of high achievement and performance in America's community colleges.

Awarded every two years since 2011, the prize recognizes high achieving colleges with measurable improvements in student outcomes, selected from more than 1,000 community colleges nationwide. Focused on student access and success, the Aspen Prize recognizes community colleges with exceptional achievements in four areas:

- Student learning
- Certificate and degree completion while in community college and after transferring to a four-year institution;
- Workforce success: and
- Equitable outcomes for students of color and low-income students.

"Texas community colleges are student-centric, reform-minded, and responsive to the changing landscape of higher education and workforce needs of the state," says Jacob Fraire, President and CEO of the Texas Association of Community Colleges (TACC). "It is no wonder that four of the ten finalists are Texas institutions. We are proud of our Member colleges, whose commitment to reforms like <u>Guided Pathways and Mathways</u> result in better student outcomes, all the while shouldering the lion's share of enrollments in Texas public higher education." In fall 2019, community colleges enrolled 93% of the dual credit enrollments and 47% of the total enrollments in Texas.

Aspen will continue to work with a team of national experts to collect extensive, additional data and conduct virtual site visits to the 10 finalist colleges. The \$1 million Aspen Prize purse will be awarded in 2021 to the winner, two or three finalists-with-distinction, and a "Rising Star" that has achieved exceptional levels of improvement.

#### Texas Success Center Awarded \$1.5 Million for Texas Pathways

The Texas Success Center, a division of the Texas Association of Community Colleges, has received a \$1.5 million, threeyear grant from the Michael & Susan Dell Foundation. This award allows the center to continue its Texas Pathways work in providing statewide coordination of student success strategies and implementing structured academic and career pathways at scale across 49 public community colleges of Texas.

"Since the beginning of the Texas Pathways strategy, participating colleges have seen measurable improvements in student success," says Texas Success Center Vice President, Dr. Cynthia Ferrell. "These contributions allow us to prepare and propel the next generation of intellectual leaders."

In total, the Texas Success Center has now received \$9.8 million in grants that support the implementation of the 5-year Texas Pathways strategy. Other philanthropic partners consist of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, Greater Texas Foundation, Houston Endowment, Meadows Foundation, T.I.L. Temple Foundation, Teagle Foundation and the Trellis Foundation.

#### Community College Taskforce Proposes Funding Reforms Focused On Student Outcomes

Austin, TX – The Texas Association of Community Colleges (TACC) announces the release of *Investing in Student*.

Success. The report examines Texas's Success Point community college funding model and provides recommendations for better aligning funding with student needs and college performance. The report reflects nearly two years of work by the Community College Metrics Taskforce in collaboration with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB).

The Success Point model rewards community colleges when their students achieve certain academic progression milestones, each of which carries a weight. The biennial budget for FYs 2020-2021 included two key changes to Success Point milestones and suggested future modifications to the weights. The Community College Metrics Taskforce met from August to December 2019 to examine the suggested changes in House Bill 1, develop recommendations, and produce a final report.

"We started with a close look at the data to identify areas where funding isn't supporting best practices," says Dr. Jeremy McMillen, President of Grayson College and Chair of the Taskforce. "We've learned so much about how to help students overcome barriers, succeed academically, and connect with workforce opportunities. It's time to invest in those strategies, and these recommendations make important steps in that direction."

#### The Taskforce found:

- Dual credit courses effectively increase college enrollment and success rates, but existing policies do not adequately
  fund dual credit or incentivize colleges to create and deliver longer sequences of dual credit coursework
- Academically and economically disadvantaged students are a growing majority of community college students, but the Success Point model does not reflect the additional barriers they must overcome to achieve transfer or completion metrics
- The critical fields designation process is out-of-date and lacks much-needed transparency and predictability, and the fields do not align well with Texas' workforce needs

"Texas community colleges are avid supporters of performance-based funding. This report provides a thorough review of all relevant metrics for measuring students' academic progression and lays the groundwork for the next decade of community college success," says Dr. Brenda Hellyer, Chancellor of San Jacinto College. "The report is intended to inform policy leaders and higher education stakeholders. The recommendations will be a major part of TACC's funding recommendations for the biennial budget for FYs 2022-23."



\* The Taskforce recommends a process of adding and removing targeted fields conducted by an official committee of appropriate state agency staff and stakeholder representatives. The committee would apply a formal methodology to the most recent, reasonably available, reliable data to approve two sets of fields: one recommended for addition to the targeted fields list, and one recommended for removal from the targeted fields list. These lists would be sent to the Career and Technical College Formula Advisory Committee, which would incorporate them in its recommendations to the THECB (typically issued in January of even-numbered years), to be approved effective in April.

# Signature Legislative Accomplishments 2017 and 2019 Sessions

- **Formula Funding:** HB 1(2019) increased formula funding by \$68M above the 2018-19 biennium. Combined with a \$20M increase in 2017, this is a 5% increase since the 2015 Session. The Student Success Points rate increased from \$171 to \$203.
- **Property Tax Revenue:** Secured an exemption for community colleges from the lower rollback rate provisions in SB 2 (2019). The "voter-approved rate" remains at 8% for community colleges.
- **Transfer Policy:** SB 25(2019) includes provisions advanced by TACC and is devoid of provisions opposed by TACC, specifically changes to the Core Curriculum.
- **Dual Credit:** SB 1324 and SB 25 (2019) adopts TACC recommendations for dual credit programs.
- **Workforce Training:** HB 2994 (2017) authorizes formula funding for short-term non-credit workforce training programs not previously funded.
- TACC actively supported bills important to individual Member colleges.
- TACC defeated or defused adverse bills opposed by Member colleges.
