



# Why Assess Basic Needs?



#### Answer questions like...

- 1. How many students could benefit from additional resources like campus food pantries, emergency aid, or crisis housing?
- 2. Which types of students ought to be flagged for additional outreach by early alert systems?
- 3. To what extent should the security of students' basic needs become a campus priority?
- 4. How many students who are dealing with basic needs insecurity use resources or supports at your college?



Is there a 'best way' to assess whether students' basic needs are being met?



#### DEFINING BASIC NEEDS

Students' basic needs include access to nutritious and sufficient food; safe, secure, and adequate housing—to sleep, study, cook, and shower; healthcare to promote sustained mental and physical well-being; affordable technology and transportation; resources for personal hygiene care; and childcare and related needs\*.

- 2. Who should collect data?
- 3. Who should take the survey?
- 4. How do you recruit students to take the survey?



#### **BASIC NEEDS INSECURITY RATES**





#### Food Insecurity



- Definition: The limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate and safe food, or the ability to acquire such food in a socially acceptable manner.
- Measurement: USDA Food Security Survey Question Module – 6-, 10-, or 18-item versions



# Examples of Questions on USDA Modules

In the last 30 days...

- ...the food that I bought just didn't last, and I didn't have money to get more
- ...did you ever eat less than you felt you should because there wasn't enough money for food?
- ...I relied on only a few kinds of low-cost food to feed my children because I was running out of money to buy food.



### Housing Insecurity



- Definition: encompasses a broad set of challenges that prevent someone from having a safe, affordable, and consistent place to live.
- Measurement: Use a nine-item set of questions developed by our team at The Hope Center. It looks at factors such as the ability to pay rent and the need to move frequently.



#### Examples of Questions on Housing Insecurity

In the past 12 months...

- ...was there a rent or mortgage increase that made it difficult to pay?
- ...did you move in with other people, even for a little while, because of financial problems?
- ...did you live with others beyond the expected capacity of the house or apartment?



#### Homelessness



- **Definition:** A person does not have a fixed, regular, and adequate place to live.
- Measurement: In alignment with the *McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act*, students are considered homeless if they identified as experiencing homelessness or signs of homelessness.



#### Examples of Questions on Experiencing Homelessness

In the past 12 months, have you slept in any of the following places? (*Please check all that apply*)

- Temporarily staying with a relative, friend, or couch surfing until I find other housing
- Temporarily at a hotel or motel without a permanent home to return to (not on vacation or business travel)
- At a shelter
- Outdoor location
