





Pillar 1: Mapping Pathways to Student End Goals

Validated Responses from 2021 SOAA: Cadre 1+ and Cadre 1 (N=20)




- The majority of colleges are scaling (reaching 50% of students) or at scale (reaching 80% of students) in each essential practice in pillar 1.
- Colleges have made the most progress in aligning math with students' programs and end goals.
- Colleges are modernizing their websites to communicate pathways.



Pillar 1: Mapping Pathways to Student End Goals

Validated Responses from 2021 SOAA: Cadre 2 and Cadre 3 (N=17)




- Compared to cadres 1+ and 1, more colleges are in the planning stages for pillar 1, preparing to scale up practices to reach more students.
- Colleges have made the most progress in aligning math with students' programs and end goals.
- Institutional resources have constrained scaling some practices.



Pillar 2: Helping Students Choose and Enter a Path


Validated Responses from 2021 SOAA: Cadre 1+ and Cadre 1 (N=20)



- The majority of these colleges are scaling or at scale in each essential practice in pillar 2.
- Colleges have made the most progress in providing supports in gateway math and English, as most colleges have fully implemented corequisite support.

Pillar 2: Helping Students Choose and Enter a Path

Validated Responses from 2021 SOAA: Cadre 2 and Cadre 3 (N=17)




- Compared to cadres 1+ and 1, more colleges are in the planning stages for pillar 2.
- Most colleges are offering corequisite support in gateway math and English.
- Many colleges are exploring ways to systematize career exploration and program planning.



Pillar 3: Keeping Students on a Path

Validated Responses from 2021 SOAA: Cadre 1+ and Cadre 1 (N=20)




- Colleges have made the most progress in redesigning advising practices and program planning.
- Many colleges continue to address capacity issues offering ongoing and intrusive advising.
- Colleges understand the importance of scheduling around student program plans and are actively trying to coordinate processes to change scheduling practices.



Pillar 3: Keeping Students on a Path

Validated Responses from 2021 SOAA: Cadre 2 and Cadre 3 (N=17)




- Compared to colleges in cadres 1+ and 1, colleges in cadres 2 and 3 are planning for full implementation of pillar 3 practices.
- Most colleges need additional resources to fully scale pathways-aligned advising practices.
- Some colleges have innovated to offer pathways advising using limited resources.



Pillar 4: Ensuring Students are Learning

Validated Responses from 2021 SOAA: Cadre 1+ and Cadre 1 (N=20)




- Most colleges have defined program learning outcomes (PLOs), but many continue to systematize PLO assessment and improvement cycles based on PLO assessment.
- Colleges provide active and applied learning opportunities across programs.
- Experiential learning is fully scaled in workforce programs, but most colleges do not yet offer experiential learning in all academic programs.



Pillar 4: Ensuring Students are Learning

Validated Responses from 2021 SOAA: Cadre 2 and Cadre 3 (N=17)



- Most colleges are planning to scale pillar 4 practices.
- Like colleges in cadres 1+ and 1, these colleges are exploring how to systematize active and applied learning techniques across programs, as well as expanding experiential learning in academic programs.



FY 2018 – Dec. 31, 2022

- \$11 million (\$3M annually in FY 21 & 22) 100% grant funded
- \$220 K per institution (7 and 3 free, plus travel)
- New grants and invitations from Trellis, Annie E. Casey and Houston Endowment
- 7 FTE TACC staff (more than doubles the TACC support to colleges)
- 18 coaches and consultants
- 6 research fellows and contracted research assistant

Budget Notes

Calendar Years 2023 -2027

- \$14+ M (\$2.8 M annually)
- \$290 K per institution
- 8 FTE TACC staff
- 18 coaches and consultants (including comms)
- 6 research fellows and contracted research assistant
