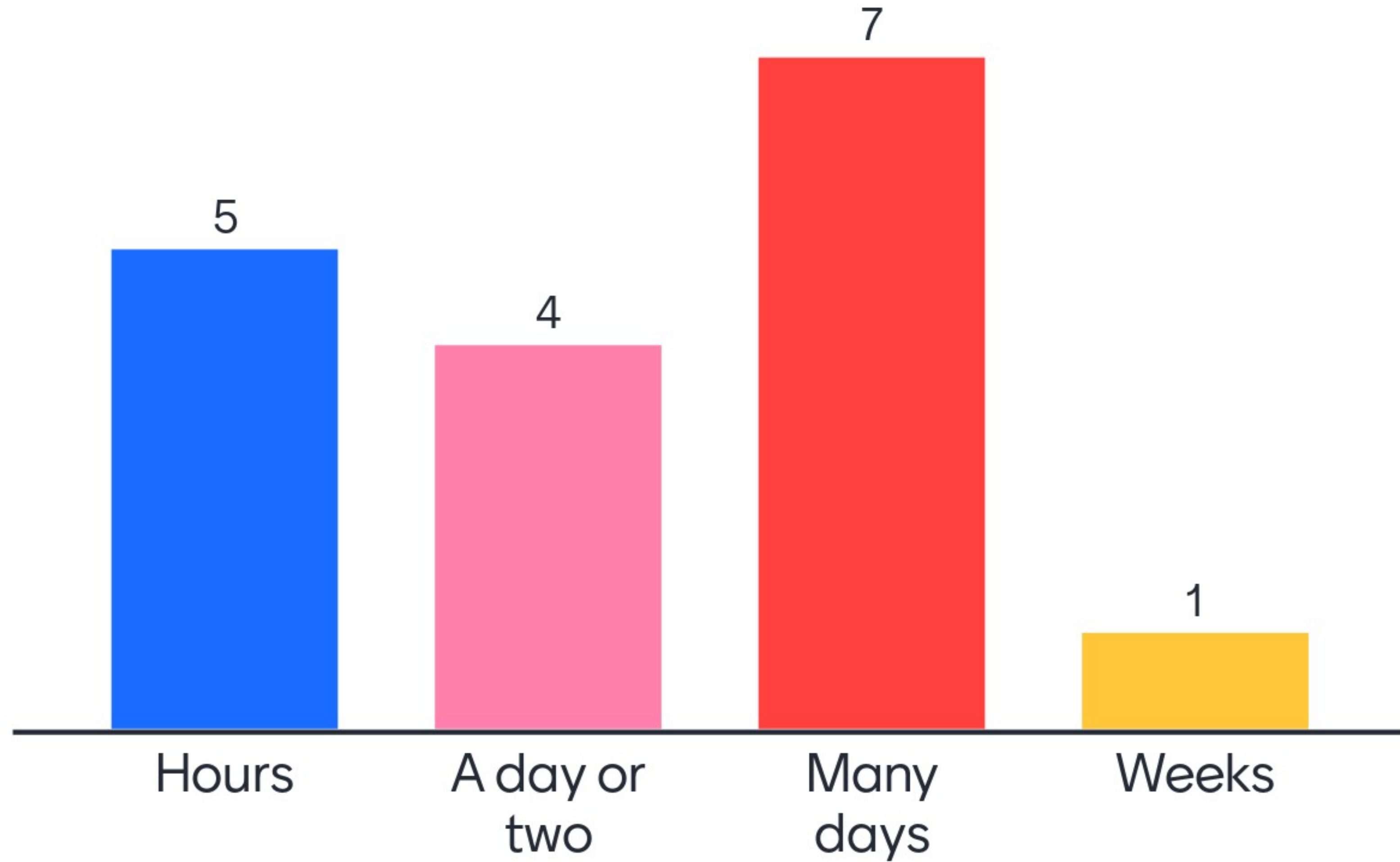
Lack of proof of the situation or past situation the student has been through

Students get help fast

How long did it take until help arrived?



Most students who need emergency aid don't get it

Emergency aid= fast, flexible, relatively small grants

85% of students dealing with BNI don't get EA

This is especially common for BIPOC students, despite high rates of need.

Assume they wont qualify and they just dont.

Lack of proof, no documentation of past experiences that would qualify them for additional aid

What keeps students from emergency aid

- I don't know about the program
- I don't know if I'm eligible
- I don't know how to apply
- I think other students need it more
- I can't meet the qualifications
- I can't complete all the paperwork
- It takes too long for funds to arrive



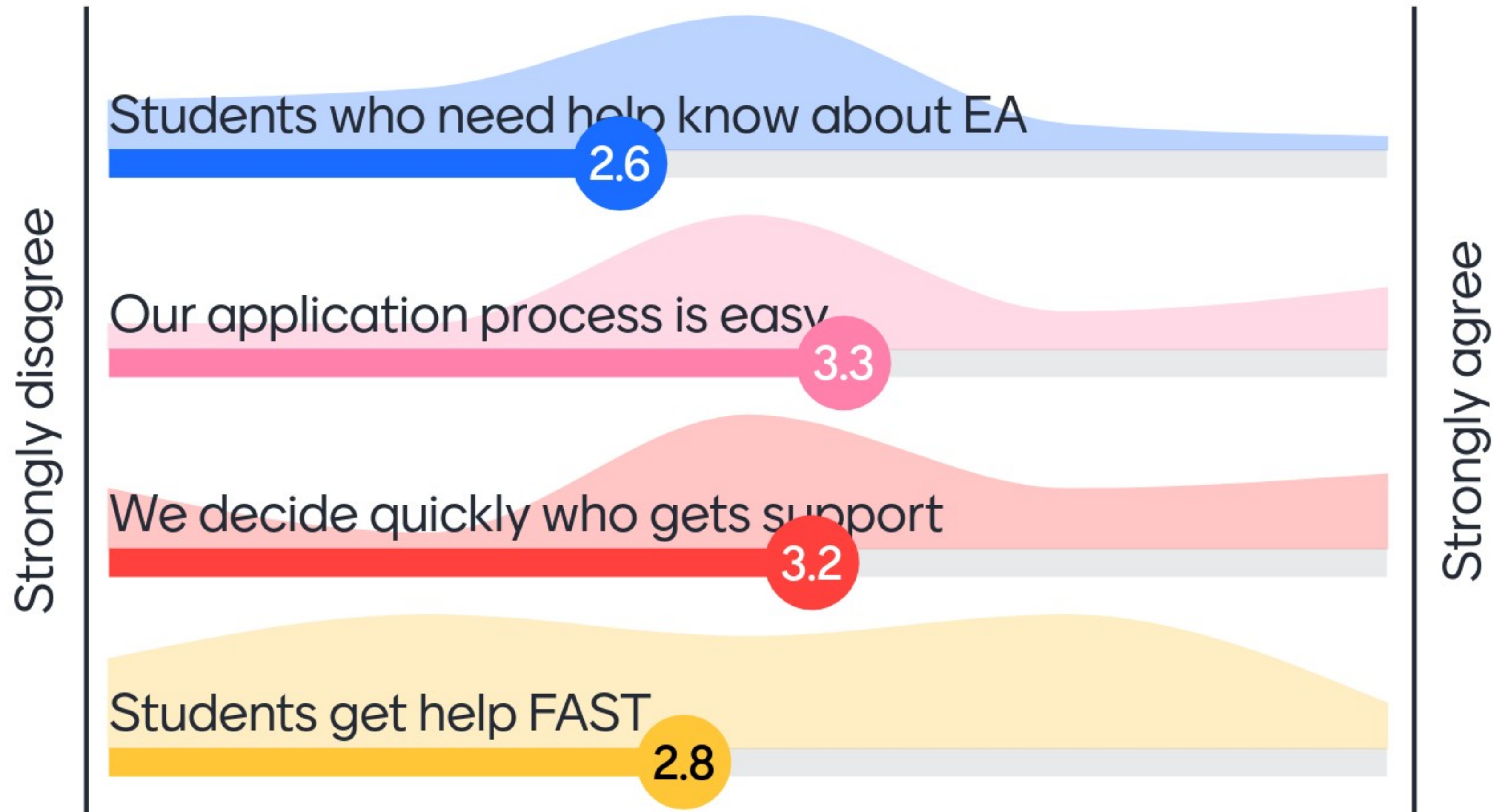
Where to focus on improvements

- Reduce application barriers
- Reduce the time it takes

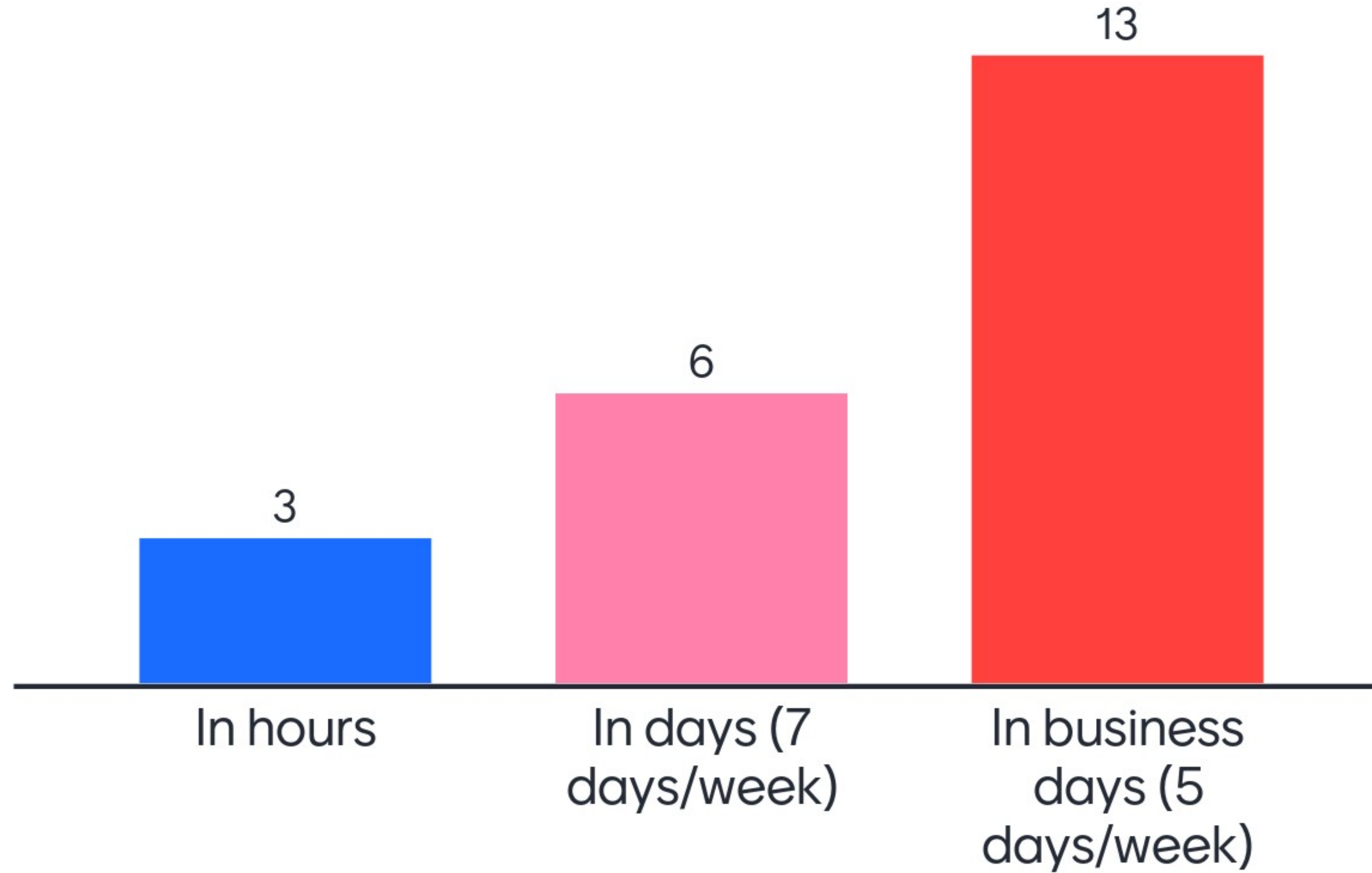
Think about *emergency* aid at your college

Focus on the parts you know best.

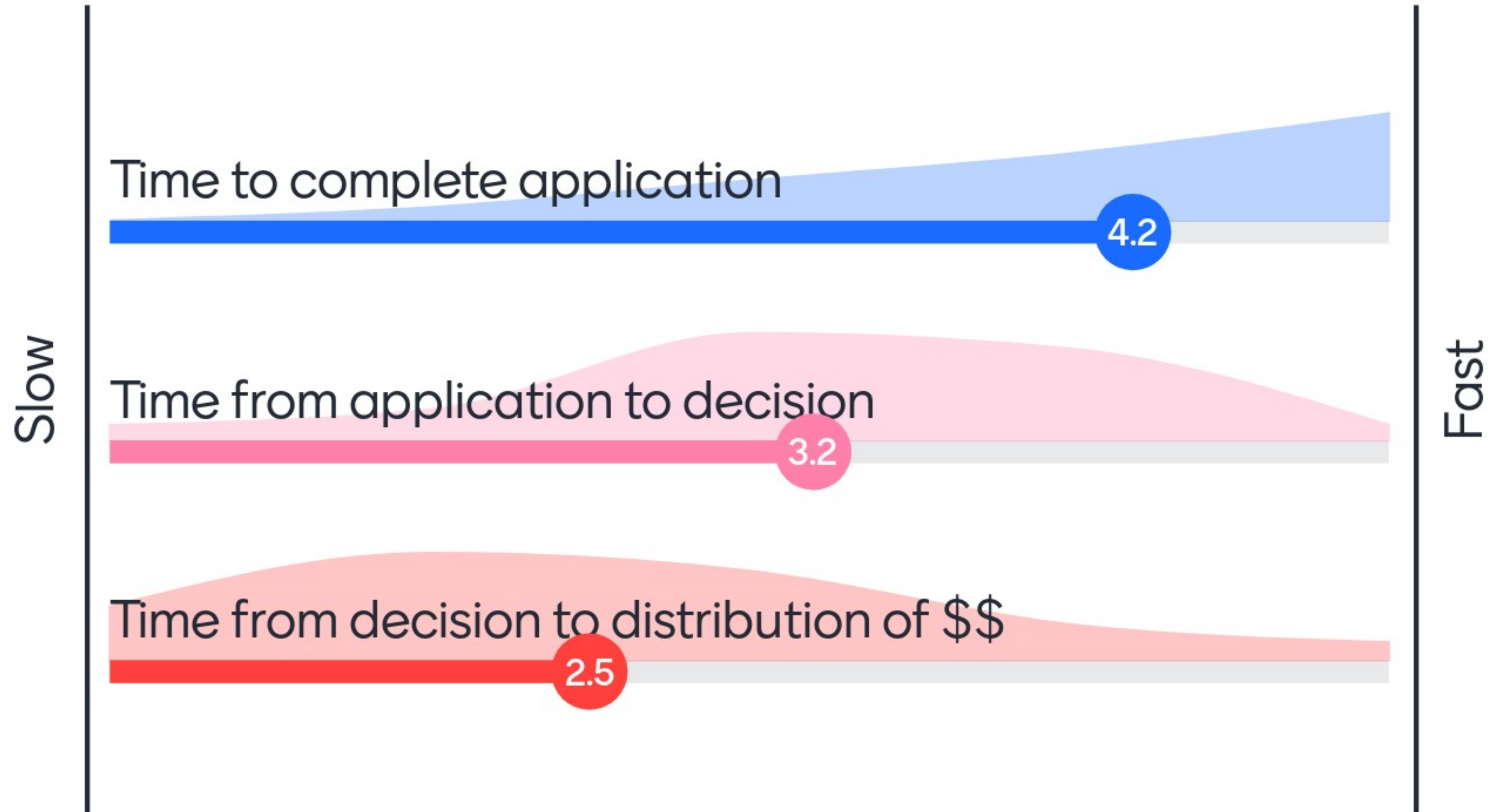
To what extent do you think...

We find institutions are taking ~14 days

- Range is 2-18 days
- 2 days uses technology
- 18 days uses committees

Colleges that move faster

- Trust students
- Use technology and social media
- Cut red tape
- Use multiple funding sources

Colleges that move more equitably

- Look beyond FAFSA
- Don't rely on enrollment
- Award multiple times
- Move fast



What might make it easier for students to get EA at your college?

advertise it more

There's an ap for that!

Coordinated communication efforts college-wide

post flyers or posters around campus

Advertise!

Less intrusive application process

Advertise throughout the semester rather than only in the beginning of the semester

Don't rely on showing need through a bill

have a 24 hour processing center

What might make it easier for students to get EA at your college?

Streamline the distribution process

Advertise more

Use tech

More knowledgeable people on campus to advocate for students

Faster disbursement turn around

Use technology!

Get rid of recommendations from faculty or staff.

Reach out to those who have not applied to ask if they need assistance

Colleges should trust their students more. From my experience with students, students don't like to ask for help, it takes a lot of courage for them to do so.

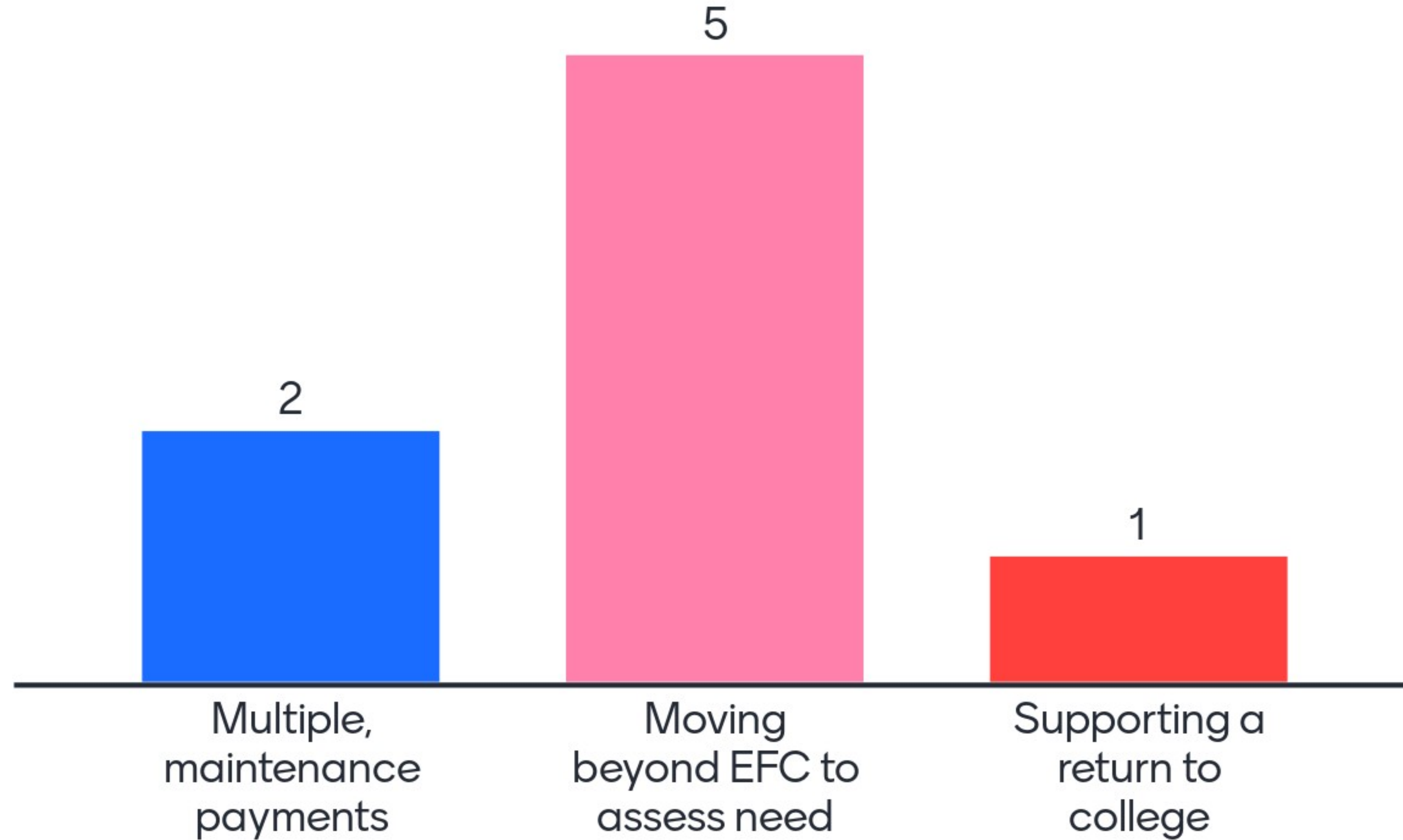
moving beyond
