Little did I know, this would be the first of many years that I would spend in the middle east. On October 30, 2008, my wife and I were married in Savannah, Georgia, just two days before I left for my second deployment with the Army. We spent the entire first year of our marriage apart, except for my two weeks of leave. After returning home, I enrolled in the Navarro College Fire Academy and completed the Emergency Medical Technician – Basic program immediately after. However, I wasn't destined to be home for good yet, and took employment for a security company providing diplomatic security at the US Embassy in Baghdad in 2010. Aside from a two-year break beginning in 2013 after my daughter was born, I worked at the Baghdad embassy until May 2022 when I finally called it quits, this time for good, to pursue a new career. This new career would need to provide me with the sense of purpose and honor that I had grown accustomed to, but also allow me to be at home with my family and watch my children grow up. After seeing my wife complete the Navarro ADN program and embark on a rewarding career as

a Registered Nurse (RN), the decision was too easy. So, I began the process of becoming an RN, through the tried-and-true educational institution in my hometown, Navarro College.

From registration to graduation, Navarro College has a streamlined administrative process that allowed a smooth transition from the workforce into student life. I was able to complete all my ADN prerequisites online while I still worked in Baghdad, alleviating a large amount of stress relating to the transition into student life at the age of 38. In doing so, I managed to obtain the Pre-Bachelor in Nursing A.S. degree one month prior to beginning the ADN program. The Navarro ADN program and staff have been amazing, and I am extremely privileged to follow in my wife's footsteps and learn from the wonderful and knowledgeable nurses that Navarro has employed. The program has provided me with the foundation and skills to become an RN, while instructors have also been successful in imprinting upon me a sense of compassion and caring that I never knew was possible. Lets face it, nursing is pretty much the opposite of my previous endeavors and requires a completely new mindset. As a student nurse, I have been able to learn at many different clinical sites where I have practiced and honed my nursing skills, also while representing Navarro College proudly.

Now, with graduation just 68 days away, my fellow classmates and I are already interviewing for residency programs throughout the Dallas/Ft. Worth area at some of the busiest and most respected hospitals in Texas. A nurse residency is an educational program within the hospital that builds upon the knowledge we have learned at the Navarro ADN program and focuses on the specialty that we have joined, such as the Intensive Care Unit or Emergency Department. I have no doubt that my classmates and I will be that much better having received our education from the Navarro College ADN program.

Navarro College has become home to others in my family as well, such as my sister-in-law. She completed the Navarro Licensed Vocational Nursing program in August of 2023 and has just been accepted into the Navarro LVN to RN bridge program. Furthermore, my two oldest children, twin girls that will be graduating in May 2024 from high school, are both already registered for Navarro's Pre-Bachelor of Nursing degree to begin their prerequisites. Not only has Navarro College itself made a lasting, generational impression on my family, but so has the ADN program. These are great examples of the positive impact that Navarro has and will have on their futures and on mine. My future will always be brighter when my children and loved ones have obtained educations that lead to honorable, fulfilling careers.
