Discussion Guide for Module 0: Introduction to Data-Informed Governance Learning Modules

Purpose & Overview

This discussion guide is designed to help you apply the concepts from Module 0 to your own governance practice. As you learned in the module, data-informed governance empowers trustees to make better policy and resource allocation decisions by asking not just what the data says, but why it matters, how it aligns with institutional priorities, and what the broader implications might be.

Key Points to Remember

Data-informed governance is:

- Cyclical & Dynamic Guided by the nine-step DIG Framework
- Strategic Focused on governance-level decisions, not on operations
- Collaborative Requires effective board-CEO partnership
- Time-bound Have clear deadlines that create urgency for change
