## What is a Rural College?

A Rural College generally defined as an institution of higher education (most often a community college or technical college) whose main campus is located in a geographic area officially classified as rural, non-metropolitan, or outside the boundaries of a major urban center.

## **Rural Leader Learning Community**

- Organized and facilitated by the National Center for Inquiry and Improvement (NCII)
  - Twenty-six leaders from 25 states convened in 2020-2022
  - The group explored common challenges and collectively addressed issues related to their redesign and institutional improvement efforts
- Published the Rural Community College Leader series, a series of six action-oriented briefs:
  - o Creating a College-going Mindset
  - Acting Boldly to Build Financial Solvency
  - Cultivation Partnerships to Support Students' Basic Needs
  - Diversifying Faculty at Rural Colleges
  - Redesigning Advising and Support Services
  - Collaborating to Create Regional Economic Opportunity

#### **Strengths**

- Affordable housing for faculty and students
- Distance between homes, K12, colleges, employers and universities
- Gaps between available good jobs and skilled workforce
- Trust/understanding: "Is college worth it?"
- Gaps in success outcomes among student populations.

## Rural Guided Pathways Project Overview

A multi-year project with a national cohort of rural community colleges who will work together — and with community partners in their regions — to implement pathways to economic prosperity.



# Rural Pathways Phase I (2022 to 2024)

- National cohort of 16 rural community colleges
- First of its kind in two ways
  - Only pathways institute structure focused specifically on the needs of rural institutions
  - First time community partners are deeply embedded in pathways implementation.

## Rural Pathways Phase II (2025 to 2027)

- Expands Rural Pathways to 28 colleges
  - 15 of the 16 colleges returned for Phase 2
- Participating colleges work with each other and community partners in their regions
  - Designing and implementing a better student experience
  - Ensuring that more students earn credentials and move on to livingwage jobs or transfer to a four-year institution with junior status
  - Collaborating with key stakeholders to increase economic opportunity in their region through a cross-sector approach
  - Implementing evidence-based reforms that lead to improved educational and workforce outcomes.



## Overview of Cohort College Enrollment

- Colleges range in size from 500 to 8,200 (F23 enrollment)
- 95,000+ students across the 28 colleges
- 70% part-time students on average
- 27% of the students are over 25 yrs.
- 31% of the students are under 18 yrs.

### **Project Professional Development and Support**

**Institutes** 

Six 2 ½ day institutes. Participating colleges will send an 8-person team to each institute.

**Coaches** 

Colleges will have an assigned implementation coach & leadership coach

**Site Visits** 

Colleges will have one site visit from its rural pathways coach each year

**Office Hours** 

Each college team will participate in two virtual office hours per semester

Virtual Consultancies

Each college team will be invited to two virtual consultancies annually

#### **College Roles & Expectations**

Pathways Project Team Leadership and Composition:

- CEOs are required to attend and actively oversee the work with support from designated Rural Pathways Leads
- CEOs designate five or six (5–6) **community partners** who are committed allies in enhancing regional economic opportunity
- College CEOs & Project Leads also identify a core project team who help advance the work over the project.

#### **College Roles & Expectations**

Participation and engagement throughout the project:

- Colleges send an eight-person team to each Institute (6)
- CEO and the Pathways Project Lead attend every Institute
- College teams participate in virtual support events
- College teams coordinate with the Implementation Coach to set agenda for one coaching visit to the college each year
- CEO and Project Lead participate in each coaching visit and all other project support structures.

#### **Rural Pathways Implementation Coaches**

14 Implementation Coaches are grouped into two-person teams

- Each coach is responsible for leading the work of 2 colleges
- Coaches work with their partner to provide backup for 2 additional colleges
- Coaches provide facilitation, guidance, leadership, and support to their colleges through the following activities:
  - During team time at all Institutes
  - Have regular check-in meetings with college project leads
  - Support their colleges as they prepare for the institutes
  - Work with the CEO and Project Lead to conduct one site visit each year.

#### **Rural Pathways Leadership Coaches**

There are six Rural Pathways Leadership Coaches

- Role is to support the institution when participating in the Aspen Leadership Teams curriculum
- Leadership coaches attend two in-person institutes
  - Spring 2025 and Fall 2027
- Leadership coaches facilitate the virtual Aspen Leadership Teams events:
  - September 3rd, 2025
  - February 6th, 2026
  - September 3rd, 2026
  - February 5th, 2027

### Aligning Initiatives – Why?

- Create a coherent student success ecosystem between initiatives that share the same ultimate goal (Achieving the Dream, Caring Campus, Unlocking Opportunities etc.)
- To prevent resource drain, eliminate redundancy, fatigue and student/staff confusion, while maximizing collective impact
- Create a clear student experience where success initiatives feel like a single, coordinated system.

Alignment shifts the focus from managing individual programs to leading a single coherent student success strategy.

#### **Aligning Initiatives – How?**

- **Centralized Oversight** authority to coordinate all major initiatives is given to a single leadership entity (VP, Steering Committee etc.)
- Integrated Teams Cross-functional teams or workgroups are established, requiring key personnel from different projects to meet regularly and share progress
- Unified Intake / Referral System all student support programs are required to use the same platform or system
- **Common Metrics** all projects agree on a core set of shared success metrics (e.g., fall-to-fall retention, course completion in gateway math, and credential attainment). **Collective effort** drives institutional improvement


By creating an overarching structure that connects the goals, processes, and data of separate projects
