

## JOB TRAINING IN PRISON

While 94% of those in federal and state prisons will rejoin society, many are released without the necessary skills to obtain employment upon reentry.

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
However, participating in job training while incarcerated significantly reduces the gap in skills.

On average, students who participate in job training in prison score 12 points higher in literacy and 18 points higher in numeracy than incarcerated adults who do not.

Although job training equips adults with the critical skills necessary for employment, only 23 percent participate while in prison.
